What are the important beliefs in Judaism?

Jewish people believe in God. They believe in the Old Testament, but not the New Testament.

They believe that, through Moses, God led the people of Israel out of slavery in Egypt.

Jewish people believe that the Ten Commandments are their rules from God.

This is the place where Jewish people go to worship. It is a beautiful building with unique features. Take a look at these pictures of two Synagogues.

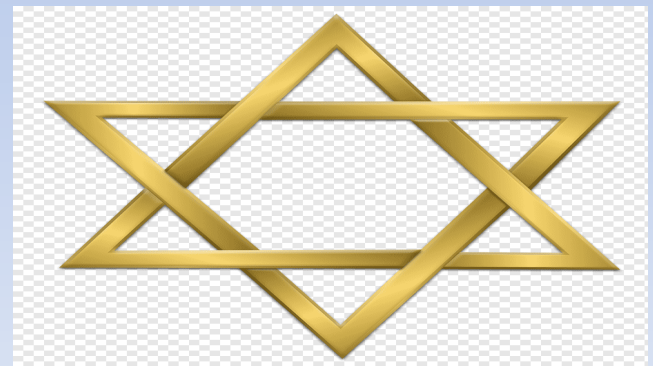
You may have noticed the star that sits on the front of the Synagogue.

This is called the Star of David.

It is a common symbol associated with Judaism and the Jewish people.

It represents the connection between the three main Jewish points of faith:

- The Holy One (God)
- The Holy Book (The Torah)
- The Holy Place (Israel)

The Shabbat

Shabbat means 'Sabbath'. It is the Jewish day of rest, where they remember that God rested on the seventh day after creating the world. This happens every Saturday.

Jewish people go to the Synagogue on Shabbat because they gather as a community to worship and celebrate the seventh day of God's Creation.

This is the Jewish New Year, a holiday that is observed with festive meals.

It is also a day that is spent in quiet prayer where Jews think about God and thank him for his creation. This will often be celebrated in the Synagogue.

Yom Kippur

Yom Kippur, also known as the Day of Atonement, is the holiest day of the year in Judaism. Its central themes are atonement and repentance. Jews traditionally observe this holy day with a day-long fast and intensive prayer, often spending most of the day in synagogue services asking God for forgiveness.

The Passover is very special to the Jewish people because it remembers how the people of Israel were led out of slavery in Egypt by Moses.

L/O: To understand the significance of the Passover

What is the story?

- Over 3,000 years ago, a group of Jewish people called the Israelites were being kept in slavery by the ruler of Egypt called Pharaoh.
- A man called Moses went to see Pharaoh many times to ask him to let them go, but Pharaoh refused.
- Moses told him that if he did not release them, God would make terrible things called *plagues* happen to the Egyptians.
- But Pharaoh did not listen, so the plagues came.
- These ten plagues included the River Nile turning to blood, frogs covering the land, insect infestations, animals dying, Egyptians getting skin diseases, the sun stopping shining and the first-born child in Egyptian families being killed by an angel.
- God is said to have told Moses to tell the Israelites to paint lamb's blood on their doorposts. This way, the angel would know that Jewish people lived there. It would *pass over* that house and not kill the first-born child.
- This is where the name *Passover* comes from.

The Passover Meal

- At the beginning of Passover in the evening, family and friends will get together for a meal and a special service called a *Seder*.
- There is a special Seder plate which has certain things on it:

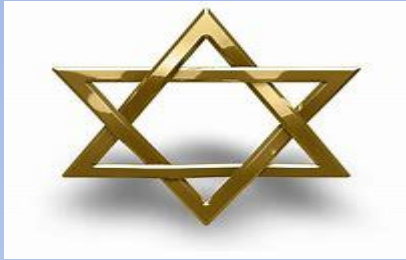
