Sports News

We have had another great half term of sporting activity. At the Sports Hall Athletics competition, a team of sixteen Year 5 and 6 pupils and sixteen Year 3 and 4 pupils competed over two days in January. They demonstrated excellent skills, determination, and teamwork. The Year 5 and 6 team were winners on the day of their competition and were only just knocked into second place overall out of eighteen schools on the second day of the event. In Gymnastics, a team of six Year 6 pupils entered a competition at Stortford Gymnastics. The team worked extremely hard in the build-up to the competition to learn the complex routine. All pupils performed superbly and were fantastic representatives of the school. The standard of gymnastics at the competition was very high and we only just missed out on a medal, coming fourth overall.

Next half term will see the school competing in a Yr2 gymnastics tournament, UKS2 hockey tournament and the conclusion of our football league, where we are currently undefeated.





Playground Leaders:

Lots more children have been getting active in the playground at lunchtimes over the last few weeks. A team of Year 4, 5 and 6 pupils underwent an afternoon of training to become Playground Leaders. Each lunchtime the playground leaders supervise and lead a variety of activities that all children can join in, including traditional playground games, sporting equipment and a quiet area for those who would like to read or draw. The games area has proved very popular and the children have enjoyed having a wider variety of activities to take part in.

Reminders:

- Children should not be wearing an iwatch in school- only normal watches which do not have access to the internet/ web are allowed.
- We are a NUT FREE school due to the increasing number of children with severe nut allergies. Do not include any form of nut in your child's snack or packed lunch- this includes Nutella.
- Snacks brought in at KS2 should be healthy and not consist of junk food, or fruit snacks which are man-made and contain high levels of sugar.
- PRIME drink is not allowed in school. Your child does not need an energy fuelled drink during the school day. The only drink your child should bring in is water.

School Car Park Gates

Parents and children should not walk through the car park gates at any time. It may be the shortest route to the playground path, but it is incredibly dangerous and is reinforcing to your child that it is safe to walk through any open gate.


This half term has continued to be busy for us.

We have continued to lead short weekly prayer sessions in each class based on the Sunday Gospel. We have become much more confident in asking the children some challenging, reflective questions.

Our school was set a challenge by Mr Johnston (headteacher of St Mary's) to think about how we show respect to everyone in our school community as each one of us is a 'thumbprint of God'. We had the very challenging job of distributing and collecting the cards from each class that are now on display in St Mary's.

We led the readings for our whole-school Ash Wednesday liturgy and helped the children to understand how they can grow closer to Jesus during Lent.

R.E. learning this half term:





"Moses's mother wanted him to be safe, so she put him in the basket in the river. He grew up in the palace with the pharaoh. When Moses grew up, God talked to him through a burning bush. God told Moses to go back to Egypt and free all the Israelites from slavery. The pharaoh didn't listen, so God sent the ten plagues; the last plague was the 'angel of death'. The Israelites were

saved because they followed the instructions that God gave to Moses: the angel of death saw the lamb's blood on their doors and passed over their homes. Then God helped Moses to part the sea so that the Israelites could escape. When all the Israelites were through, the sea joined together again, and the Egyptian chariots all drowned. God's people were happy to be free from slavery."

Eliza - Fir Class (Year 2)

The children have all been learning about the story of Exodus in their R.E. lessons this half term; there have been many lively discussions about how and why Moses freed the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. Our younger children have been learning to identify the important characters from Exodus and retell the many events of the story in order. Our KS2 children have been focusing on linking the events from Exodus to the life of Jesus and our ultimate salvation.

"Jesus re-enacted the Passover on Maundy Thursday when he ate unleavened bread, just like the Israelites did. Jesus remembered the instructions that God gave to the Israelites through Moses."

Lent at St Joseph's

We started our Lenten journey on Wednesday 14th February with our Ash Wednesday Liturgy. Fr Marco told us that Lent is a time when we think carefully about how we can grow closer to Jesus by praying, fasting and giving. The 40 days of Lent are a perfect opportunity for us to 'spring-clean' our hearts. The ashes are an outward sign of our acceptance that we have made mistakes and our commitment to work hard to not repeat behaviour choices that have hurt others, but instead think about how we can bring more joy to those around us.



After half term, our Lenten journey will continue:

- Children who have made their First Reconciliation will have the opportunity to receive the Sacrament from Fr Marco in school.

- The 'Monday Mission' delivered by the Chaplaincy Team will be on a Lenten theme: repentance, forgiveness and sacrifice.
- We will be leading 'Stations of the Cross' for KS1 and KS2 children as we draw closer to Good Friday during Holy Week.
- There will be more news to follow about our Lenten 'giving' project.
